

Example activities to demonstrate understanding of different learning objectives

<p><u>Class 1 objective</u></p> <p>To know which materials are good for keeping us warm</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- Find appropriate clothes for each of the 4 seasons in the wardrobe, put them on and take a picture or draw a picture and add labels- Sort some clothes into two piles will keep me warm/ won't keep me warm and create two lists- Look at the labels of warm clothes - can you find any materials in common- Make a list of all the items we use to keep us warm hot water bottles, blankets, coats, beanie bags etc. and write about things they have in common- Make 4 scarves out of different materials and wear one each day - decide which is best at keeping you warm	<p><u>Class 2 objective</u></p> <p>To recreate one of the Sleeping Beauty paintings as a drawing/piece of Art.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- Use props around the house (art attack style) to show sleeping beauty lying on the ground and take a photo- Paint/draw/collage a picture from one of the scenes from sleeping beauty and write a sentence to explain why it is your favourite- Junk model one of the scenes and take a photograph or write about your creation- Explore 2 different techniques and compare them by doing one half in pencil and the other in paint- Create a comic strip to retell the story of Sleeping Beauty in pictures
<p><u>Class 3 objective</u></p> <p>To recognise and describe odd and even numbers</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- Walk up and down the street and write about what you find out about odd and even numbers- Study the phone numbers of 5 local shops and see whether they contain more odd numbers or more even numbers- Practice adding 2 odd numbers together, 2 even numbers together and 1 of each - describe any patterns you discover- Look down the shopping receipt - how many odd prices are there and how many even - discuss why this might be- Write some instructions to explain to a younger child how we know whether a number is odd or even	<p><u>Class 4 objective</u></p> <p>To write a persuasive letter</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- Write to the BBC persuading them to air a new programme of your choice- Write to John Bercow to demand that the Government rethink the High Speed Rail Link- Write an instruction manual explaining exactly how to write a persuasive letter and give an example for each step- Design a new food product e.g. cereal or chocolate bar and develop an advertising campaign including a letter to an appropriate company e.g. Kellogg's or Cadbury- Type a letter to your teacher persuading them to give you more homework
